

Studies shine light on placenta mysteries

Understanding and discovery of how it can go awry sought

WASHINGTON — Scientists carefully probe a placenta donated after birth, British umbilical cord still attached. This is the body's most mysterious organ, and inside lie clues about how it gives life — and how it can go awry, leading to stillbirth, preterm birth, even infections like the Zika virus.

In labs around the country, major research is underway to finally understand and monitor this floppy bloody tissue that's often dismissed as the "afterbirth."

The stakes are high. The placenta is the ultimate multitasker: It nourishes a fetus, acts as its lungs, kidneys and liver, provides immune defense, and even produces key hormones.

"We take it for granted," said Dr. Catherine Spang of the National Institutes of Health, which has spurred

a research boom with its \$50 million Human Placenta Project. "Yet there are lifelong implications for both the mother and the baby," Zika's shocking birth defects have brought into focus the desperate need to learn how a healthy placenta does its many jobs, and find treatments for when it is underperforming.

"Tomorrow there may be a new virus," warned Dr. Yoel Sadovsky of the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center. "If I was a virus and wanted to attack humans, probably the best time to do it was during pregnancy, where you're attacking the next generation."

Doctors have few tools to examine a placenta during pregnancy. And precious as that placenta is for research, studying one that already hashered in a birth reveals only so much, like counting the rings in a downed tree to visualize the sapling.

obstetricians, really need is a way to peek at how the placenta forms and changes in the different stages of pregnancy. That could help spot problems early — such as preeclampsia, a blood pressure complication that can be life-threatening to mother and baby.

In a Washington lab, engineer Avinash Eranki turns over the donated placenta, examining the side that attached to Mom. That outer layer is made up of cells called trophoblasts that had to invade the uterine wall and burrow into maternal arteries, enlarging them to provide blood for the fetus.

The theory: If those cells get off course and the blood vessels don't widen enough, the effects of a placenta struggling to support the fetus eventually stress the mother's own organs.

The research team at Children's National Health System is using a 3-D bioprinter to create a unique living model of how a human placenta forms, to mimic how trophoblasts create that blood supply. Once it's complete, the model could help researchers test ways to detect brewing preeclampsia earlier, and intervene.

Apartment blaze kills 2, dozens hurt

SILVER SPRING, Md. — Two people died, dozens were injured and others were unaccounted for after a massive explosion and fire at an apartment complex outside the nation's capital, authorities said Thursday. Among those injured were three firefighters, treated after a large-scale rescue effort in which some people dropped children off balconies in the garden-style apartment to safety below.

The two people found dead in the debris of the four-story building have not yet been identified. Montgomery County Police Assistant Chief Russ Hamill said Thursday that the explosion's cause remains under investigation. Residents reported smelling gas before the explosion, and officials responded to calls for a potential gas leak at the complex last month.

In all, 34 people, including the three firefighters, were taken to hospitals for treatment. Hospital officials said most were released Thursday. People more than a mile away reported feeling their homes shake in the blast just before midnight Wednesday night.

Blast debris was scattered nearly 200 feet, including what appeared to be an apartment door blown all the way across a two-lane road and parking lot. Erick Jimenez was outside the building Thursday looking for his father, Caesar, who he said lived on the first floor and was not answering calls.

"I've gone to the emergen-

cy rooms. Holy Cross, Shady Grove, nobody knows," Jimenez said.

Firefighters found people on upper floors who needed help, Montgomery County Fire Chief Scott Goldstein said at a briefing. They used ladders to rescue them.

"People were dropping children and jumping out of other windows," Goldstein said.

Initially, fire officials said they were seeking five to seven people who were unaccounted for. Police said later that they don't have a firm number.

Paul Garten, regional disaster director for the American Red Cross, estimated 100 people were displaced and 60 or 70 were staying at a Red Cross shelter at a nearby community center.
