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INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

Board of Directors A.N.W. Special Education Cooperative No. 603 Humboldt, Kansas

We have audited the accompanying fund summary statement of regulatory basis receipts, expenditures, and unencumbered cash balances of A.N.W. Special Education Cooperative No. 603, Humboldt, Kansas, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2017, and the related notes to the financial statement.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of this financial statement in accordance with the Kansas Municipal Audit and Accounting Guide as described in Note 1 to meet the financial reporting requirements of the State of Kansas; this includes determining that the regulatory basis of accounting is an acceptable basis for the preparation of the financial statements in the circumstances. Management is also responsible for the design, implementation and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statement that is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the financial statement based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States and the Kansas Municipal Audit and Accounting Guide. Those standards require we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statement is free of material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statement. The procedures selected depend on auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statement, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statement in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statement.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Basis for Adverse Opinion on U.S. Generally Accepted Accounting Principles

As described in Note 1 of the Notes to Financial Statement, the financial statement is prepared by A.N.W. Special Education Cooperative No. 603, Humboldt, Kansas, to meet the requirements of the State of Kansas on the basis of the financial reporting provisions of the Kansas Municipal Audit and Accounting Guide, which is a basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

The effects on the financial statement of the variances between the regulatory basis of accounting described in Note 1 and accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, although not reasonably determinable, are presumed to be material.

Adverse Opinion on U.S. Generally Accepted Accounting Principles

In our opinion, because of the significance of the matter discussed in the "Basis for Adverse Opinion on U.S. Generally Accepted Accounting Principles" paragraph, the financial statement referred to above does not present fairly, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the financial position of A.N.W. Special Education Cooperative No. 603, Humboldt, Kansas, as of June 30, 2017, or changes in financial position and cash flows thereof for the year then ended.

Opinion on Regulatory Basis of Accounting

In our opinion, the financial statement referred to above presents fairly, in all material respects, the aggregate cash and unencumbered cash balance of A.N.W. Special Education Cooperative No. 603, Humboldt, Kansas, as of June 30, 2017, and the aggregate receipts and expenditures for the year then ended in accordance with the financial reporting provisions of the Kansas Municipal Audit and Accounting Guide described in Note 1.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated December 11, 2017 on our consideration of A.N.W. Special Education Cooperative No. 603, Humboldt, Kansas, internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering A.N.W. Special Education Cooperative No. 603, Humboldt, Kansas, internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

Report on Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the fund summary statement of regulatory basis receipts, expenditures, and unencumbered cash balances (basic financial statement) as a whole. The Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements of Federal Awards, and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. The summary of regulatory basis expenditures-actual and budget, individual fund schedules of regulatory basis receipts and expenditures-actual and budget, schedule of regulatory basis receipts and expenditures-agency funds (Schedules 1, 2 and 3 as listed in the table of contents), as required under the provisions of the Kansas Municipal Audit and Accounting Guide, are presented for analysis and are also not a required part of the basic financial statement. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statement. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statement and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statement or to the basic financial statement itself, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statement as a whole, on the basis of accounting described in Note 1.

Prior Year Comparative Analysis

The 2016 Actual columns presented in the individual fund schedules of cash receipts and expenditures actual and budget (Schedule 2 as listed in the table of contents) is also presented for comparative analysis and is not a required part of the June 30, 2017 financial statement upon which we rendered an unqualified opinion dated December 11, 2017. The 2016 financial statements and our accompanying report are not presented herein, but are available in electronic form from the web site of the Kansas Department of Administration, Office of Management Analysis and Standards. Such 2016 comparative information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the 2016 financial statement. The 2016 comparative information was subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the 2016 financial statement and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the 2016 financial statement or to the 2016 financial statement itself, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the 2016 comparative information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the 2016 financial statement as a whole, on the basis of accounting described in Note 1.

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

A. Reporting Entity

Principles Used in Determining Scope of Entity

The basic criterion used for including or excluding other governmental organizations as part of the financial statements of the Cooperative is financial accountability. Financial accountability is derived from the Cooperative's powers and includes, but is not limited to, appointment of a voting majority of the governing body, imposition of will, financial benefit/burden on primary government and fiscal dependency. The Cooperative has waived the application of generally accepted accounting principles and as such, have not included any component units in these financial statements.

B. Basis of Presentation

A fund is defined as an independent fiscal and accounting entity with a self-balancing set of accounts recording cash and other financial resources, together with all related liabilities and residual equities or balances and changes therein, which are segregated for the purpose of carrying on specific activities or attaining certain objectives in accordance with special regulations, restrictions or limitations.

The following Regulatory Basis Fund Types comprise the financial activities of the Cooperative for the year ending June 30, 2017:

<u>General Fund</u> -- the chief operating fund. Used to account for all unrestricted resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

<u>Agency Funds</u> -- funds used to report assets held by the municipal reporting entity in a purely custodial capacity.

C. Basis of Accounting

Regulatory Basis of Accounting and Departure from Accounting Principles Generally Accepted in the United States of America

The Kansas Municipal Audit and Accounting Guide regulatory basis of accounting involves the recognition of cash, cash equivalents, marketable investments, and certain accounts payable and encumbrance obligations to arrive at a net unencumbered cash and investments balance on a regulatory basis for each fund, and the reporting of changes in unencumbered cash and investments of a fund resulting from the difference in regulatory basis revenues and regulatory basis expenditures for the fiscal year. All recognized assets and liabilities are measured and reported at cost, unless they have been permanently impaired and have no future cash value or represent no future obligation against cash. The Kansas Municipal Audit and Accounting Guide regulatory basis does not recognize capital assets, long-term debt, accrued receivables and payables, or any other assets, liabilities or deferred inflows or outflows, other than those mentioned above.

The Cooperative has approved a resolution that is in compliance with K.S.A. 75-1120a(c), waiving the requirement for application of generally accepted accounting principles and allowing the Cooperative to use the regulatory basis of accounting.

D. Budgets

The Cooperative is not subject to the Kansas Budget Law, as they are not the primary taxing authority for the Cooperative. Each of the eight member districts holds the taxing authority for funds paid to the Cooperative. The Cooperative adopts an annual budget for the General Fund for managerial purposes. The budget comparisons on Schedules 1 and 2 reflect this internal managerial budget.

E. Assets, Liabilities, and Fund Equity

Cash

To facilitate better management of the Cooperative's cash resources, excess cash is combined in pooled operating accounts. Each fund's portion of total cash is based on its equity in the pooled cash amount. Cash in excess of current operating needs is invested on a pooled investment basis and earnings thereon are credited to the General Fund.

F. Revenues and Expenditures

Reimbursed Expenses

Reimbursed expenses are defined as repayments of amounts remitted on behalf of another party. All reimbursed expenses shown in the financial statements meet the following criteria: 1) the related disbursement was made in the current year on behalf of the payee, 2) the item paid for was directly identifiable as having been used by or provided to the payee, and 3) the amount of the reimbursed expense was directly tied to the amount of the original cash disbursement.

Note 2 Deposits and Investments

K.S.A. 9-1401 establishes the depositories which may be used by the Cooperative. The statute requires banks eligible to hold the Cooperative's funds have a main or branch bank in the county in which the Cooperative is located and the banks provide an acceptable rate of return on funds. In addition, K.S.A. 9-1402 requires the banks to pledge securities for deposits in excess of FDIC coverage.

K.S.A. 12-1675 allows the Cooperative to deposit idle funds in time deposits-open accounts, and certificates of deposit with allowable financial institutions; and to invest idle funds in U.S. government securities; temporary notes; no-fund warrants; repurchase agreements; and the Kansas Municipal Investment Pool.

The Cooperative held no investments at June 30, 2017 and held no investments throughout the year.

<u>Concentration of credit risk.</u> State statutes place no limit on the amount the Cooperative may invest in any one issuer as long as the investments are adequately secured under K.S.A. 9-1402 and 9-1405.

<u>Custodial credit risk – deposits</u>. Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the Cooperative's deposits may not be returned to it. State statutes require the Cooperative's deposits in financial institutions to be entirely covered by federal depository insurance or by collateral held under a joint custody receipt issued by a bank within the State of Kansas, the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City, or the Federal Home Loan Bank of Topeka, except during designated "peak periods" when required coverage is 50%. The Cooperative has not designated any peak periods.

<u>Custodial credit risk – investments</u>. For an investment, this is the risk that, in the event of the failure of the issuer or counterparty, the Cooperative will not be able to recover the value of its investments or collateral securities that are in the possession of an outside party. State statutes require investments to be adequately secured.

At June 30, 2017, the carrying amount of the Cooperative's deposits was \$2,523,709 and the bank balance was \$2,835,118. Of the bank balance, \$268,225 was covered by federal depository insurance and the remaining \$2,566,893 was collateralized with securities held by the pledging financial institutions' agents in the Cooperative's name.

Note 4 Claims and Judgments

The Cooperative participates in federal and state programs that are fully or partially funded by grants received from other governmental units. Expenditures financed by grants are subject to audit by the appropriate grantor government. If expenditures are disallowed due to noncompliance with grant program regulations, the Cooperative may be required to reimburse the grantor government. As of December 11, 2017 current year grant expenditures have not been audited, but the Cooperative believes disallowed expenditures or overpayments, if any, will not have a material effect on individual governmental funds or the overall financial position of the Cooperative.

During the course of its operations, the Cooperative is a party to various claims, legal actions and complaints. It is the opinion of the Cooperative's management and legal counsel that these matters are not anticipated to have a material impact on the Cooperative.

The Cooperative is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees and natural disasters. The Cooperative has purchased commercial insurance for these potential risks. There have been no significant reductions in insurance coverage from 2016 to 2017, and there were no settlements that exceeded insurance coverage in the past three years.

Note 5 Other Long-Term Obligations from Operations

Compensated Absences.

The Cooperative's sick leave policy allows crediting each certified employee with twelve days sick leave and two personal days per year up to a maximum of ninety days. Administrative personnel receive fourteen days sick pay and two personal days, up to a maximum of ninety days. Licensed, but non-certified personnel receive thirteen days sick leave and two personal days, up to a maximum of ninety days. If a licensed employee carrys over the full ninety days, then they have an additional discretionary day available which does not carry over.

For certified personnel only (teachers): at the time the certified employee voluntarily leaves the service of the Cooperative, if they have fifteen years of service or more, they are compensated for a portion of these unused days. There are two options to compute the compensation.

Option A: If the employee is not yet eligible to retire under KPERS, they can receive 20% of their daily salary per day for up to 80 days of their unused sick leave.

Option B: If the employee is eligible to retire under KPERS, they can receive compensation for up to 80 days of their unused sick leave at the rate of \$125 per day. The amount of days to be paid is based on a variable percentage, based on the length of time the employee continues to work past the date they are eligible to retire under KPERS and is shown on the schedule below:

Defined Benefit Pension Plan

Plan description. The Cooperative participates in the Kansas Public Employees Retirement System (KPERS), a cost-sharing, multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan as provided by K.S.A. 74-4901, et seq. Kansas law establishes and amends benefit provisions. KPERS issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. KPERS' financial statements are included in its Comprehensive Annual Financial Report which can be found on the KPERS website at www.kpers.org or by writing to KPERS (611 South Kansas, Suite 100, Topeka, KS 66603) or by calling 1-888-275-5737.

Contributions. K.S.A. 74-4919 and K.S.A. 74-49,210 establish the KPERS member-employee contribution rates. KPERS has multiple benefit structures and contribution rates depending on whether the employee is a KPERS 1, KPERS 2 or KPERS 3 member. KPERS 1 members are active and contributing members hired before July 1, 2009. KPERS 2 members were first employed in a covered position on or after July 1, 2009 and KPERS 3 members were first employed in a covered position on or after January 1, 2015. Effective January 1, 2015, Kansas law established the KPERS member-employee contribution rate of 6% of covered salary for KPERS 1, KPERS 2 and KPERS 3 members. Member contributions are withheld by their employer and paid to KPERS according to the provisions of Section 414(h) of the Internal Revenue Code.

State law provides that the employer contribution rates for KPERS 1, KPERS 2 and KPERS 3 be determined based on the results of each annual actuarial valuation. Kansas law sets a limitation on annual increases in the employer contribution rates. The actuarially determined employer contribution rate (not including the 1% contribution rate with a 0% moratorium for the period of July 1, 2017 through September 30, 2017 for the Death and Disability Program) was 10.81% for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2017. The actuarially determined employer contribution rate 12.01% for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2018. Per 2016 House Substitute for Senate Bill 161, Section 98(a)(1), state general fund and expanded lottery act revenue funds for employer contributions to KPERS were deferred. The amount deferred for school contributions was \$92,917,091 for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2016 and the anticipated repayments per SB249 were nullified per HB2052 during fiscal year 2017.

The State of Kansas contribution to KPERS for all school municipalities for the year ending June 30, 2017, received as of June 30th was \$304,596,361. Per 2017 Senate Substitute for House Bill 2052, Section 37(a), state general fund employer contribution to KPERS were decreased by \$64,130,234 for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2017. Section 43(17) of the bill also stipulates that repayments of the reduced contributions are to be amortized over twenty years at a level dollar amount commencing in fiscal year 2018. The level dollar amount was computed to be \$6.4 million per year.

The State of Kansas is required to contribute the statutory required employer's share except for retired Cooperative employees. The Cooperative is responsible for the employer's portion of the cost for retired Cooperative employees.

Net Pension Liability. At June 30, 2017, the Cooperative's proportionate share of the collective net pension liability reported by KPERS was \$12,379,388, of which \$11,286,477 was allocated to the State of Kansas and \$1,092,911 was allocated to the Cooperative. The net pension liability was measured as of June 30, 2016, and the total pension liability used to calculate the net pension liability was determined by an actuarial valuation as of December 31, 2015, which was rolled forward to June 30, 2016. Data from the June 30, 2017 KPERS report was not available at the date of this report. The Cooperative's proportion of the net pension liability was based on the ratio of the Cooperative's contributions to KPERS, relative to the total employer and non-employer contributions of the State/School subgroup within KPERS for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2016. Since the KMAAG regulatory basis of accounting does not recognize longterm debt, this liability is not reported in these financial statements.

The complete actuarial valuation report including all actuarial assumptions and methods, and the report on the allocation of the KPERS collective net pension liability to all participating employers are publicly available on the website at www.kpers.org or can be obtained as described above.

Note 7 Economic Dependency

The State of Kansas provides financial aid to the Cooperative to cover normal operating expenditures. The majority of this State Aid is passed through the eight member districts by the State and during the year ended June 30, 2017, represented 53.71% of the total revenue of the Cooperative.

The Cooperative also receives Federal aid from the U.S. Department of Education, including Medicaid payments. During the year ending June 30, 2017, this federal aid represented 12.33% of the Cooperative's total revenue.
